We Are Committed

Finger Lakes Health is committed to providing compassionate care to every member of our community, regardless of their ability to pay. It is this philosophy that guides us as a not-for-profit healthcare system. If you do not have health insurance, or think you may not be able to pay in full for your care provided by Geneva General Hospital, Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Hospital, or our affiliated practices, we can help. Our Financial Aid Program, also known as "charity care," is available to assist uninsured or underinsured members of our community who are willing, but unable to pay in part or full for their care. Financial Aid is based on your income, assets, and needs. In addition, we may be able to help you obtain free or low-cost health insurance, or work with you to establish a manageable payment plan.

As a not-for-profit health system, we return any operating surplus to the people in our community in several ways:

We provide care for those who cannot afford to pay. Many of the costs to deliver the vital services we offer are not fully covered by government programs like Medicare, Medicaid, or private insurance plans.

We subsidize the difference between the cost to deliver services and the payments from public and private insurance programs.

We reinvest in new services and programs, as well as maintenance and enhancements to facilities, property, and equipment to serve our communities.

We develop programs and community wellness initiatives to meet community health needs and promote health equity, many of which are outlined in this report.



We Are Advocates

In partnership with Ontario County Public Health, Seneca County Public Health, Yates County Public Health, SAY2 Rural Health Network/Pivital Health and Common Ground Health, Finger Lakes Health conducted a Community Health Needs Assessment and developed a Community Services plan to guide our community health efforts for 2022-2024. The Community Health Needs Assessment process involved surveys, focus groups, analyses of disease prevalence data and priority setting dialogue and meetings with a broad range of community partners and stakeholders. Using the framework of the New York State Prevention Agenda, we identified two key priority areas for 2022-2024 and worked to identify evidence-based interventions to address these priorities:

1) Food Security

2) Promote Well-Being and Prevent Mental and Substance Use Disorders

Food Security

As part of our mission to "improve the health and promote the well-being of our diverse communities through the delivery of locally accessible health system services and programs," we are providing information to help members of our community who may need assistance in securing food.

We are incorporating questions of food security into our conversations with patients at annual visits and with new patients in our outpatient practices.

Prevent Mental Health and Substance Abuse Disorders

Finger Lakes Health representatives participated in the Yates County with Systems of Care Planning meetings to address mental health needs. In addition, Finger Lakes Health offers individual and group therapy through the John D. Kelly Clinic. We have also enhanced our capabilities for and delivery of telemedicine services to expand access.
